Answers for All: Fruit Update – 4/7/23

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<u>Farm Visits</u> – It's been great finally getting around to seeing some of you this week. I missed being out on the road and you've all given me much to consider as we move forward in our first season together. I have more visits planned for next week. <u>Dormant Oils</u> – Dormant oils seem to be a hot topic right now. I see that some of you made your applications this past week, that's great. Please remember to watch the nighttime temperatures. Applications should not be made within 24-48 hours of freezing temperatures. <u>Check out the IPM website for more information on dormant/delayed dormant oil applications</u>.

<u>Fireblight Update</u> – I attended multiple webinars this winter about the state of fireblight around the Northeast. Cornell is reporting instances of *Strep*-resistant fireblight. I will have an article coming out in the next Crop Talk Newsletter giving an update on this and what we can do to combat it. For now, rest assured that **there is no streptomycin-resistant fireblight in Connecticut**.

<u>Mummy Berry</u> – As always, make sure to mulch your blueberries if you have not already. Forsythia bloom coincides with mummy berry spore maturation – that's now. Let's keep an eye on the weather, although the forecast looks good. <u>Note</u>: They are susceptible as soon as your vegetative buds show any green. Check out this <u>factsheet</u> <u>from MSU</u> for information on the disease. If you have a history of this disease, confer with <u>New England Small Fruit Management Guide</u> for information on fungicide applications.

<u>Blueberry Workshop</u> – Mary Concklin and I attended a blueberry workshop for Massachusetts growers last week. We presented growers with pruning and aisle management considerations. Here are the materials we handed out there: 1) <u>Blueberry Pruning Guide</u> and 2) <u>Blueberry Weed Management Quick Reference</u>.

<u>Peach Crop</u> – Not too much optimism for our peach crop this year.
